Idaho Povver Program Helps Customer Stay Comfortable at Home

Supporting customers in the communities we serve is important to Idaho Power. That's why when we learned 88-yearold Virginia Farmer of Twin Falls needed some home updates, we stepped in to see how we could help.

Virginia's home was built in 1936 and had seen few upgrades since then. It had poor insulation and was heated only by a few baseboard heaters and a coal furnace, which had stopped working and was deemed unrepairable.

A replacement was going to be costly and out of budget for Virginia, but thanks to Twin Falls community volunteers, Home Energy Management (HEM) and Idaho Power's Weatherization Solutions for Eligible Customers program, Virginia is now staying warm and comfortable in her home.

The weatherization program helps eligible customers reduce their energy use and lower their utility bills by covering the cost of qualifying energy-efficiency

Easy Pasta Fagioli

- 2 (15-ounce) cans white beans, drained
- 1 (28-ounce) jar marinara sauce
- 1 (14-ounce) can stewed tomatoes
- 3 cups water
- 2 cups uncooked small pasta (macaroni or spirals)

In a four-quart saucepan, combine all ingredients except pasta and cheese. Over medium-high heat, bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Add pasta, cover and simmer for an additional 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Ladle into bowls and garnish with Parmesan. Makes six servings.

improvements in electrically heated homes. After performing a home energy audit, Idaho Power and HEM determined Virginia qualified for attic and wall insulation, along with several health and safety-related updates — at no cost to her. She also qualified to have a portion of a new electric heat pump covered to replace the coal furnace. The rest was covered by local donors, and much of the labor was done by community volunteers.

"Idaho Power and the agencies have been very considerate and efficient," Virginia said. "Everything was just as nice as it could be. I don't have to wear as many layers in the winter. It's been a pleasure to have central heat and insulation something my home never had before. I am very thankful for everyone's help."
